Erdit Abedini '21 (ACES)

Hartford United – A Pilot Soccer Program for High School Students

• Erdit will establish *Hartford United*, a Hartford, CT based soccer club that provides high school students in an economically disadvantaged area the opportunity to play soccer off-season at no cost.

Madeline Beckman '19 (Allied Health Sciences, CAHNR)

Level of Acculturation and Hispanic Children's Consumption of Sugar-Sweetened Beverages: A Study to Understand and Help Prevent Childhood Obesity

Madeline will investigate the relationships between Hispanic parents' level of acculturation, parental
perceptions of the healthfulness of sugar-sweetened beverages, and childhood consumption of sugarsweetened beverages.

Celeste Kurz '19 (Nutritional Sciences, CAHNR)

Addressing Childhood Obesity by Improving Personal Factors and Language Acquisition in Middle School Students: Implementing a Bilingual, Hands-On, Gardening, Cooking, and Nutrition Education Program

 Celeste will implement and evaluate a bilingual (Spanish-English), hands-on, gardening, cooking, and nutrition education program to preventively address childhood obesity and resulting health consequences among at-risk Hispanic youth.

Maria Latta '20 (Pre-Pharmacy, ACES)

Racial and Generational Influences on the Usage of Chinese Alternative Medicine compared to American Pharmaceutical Treatments

Maria will conduct a study using survey data to examine how racial and generational factors influence
the decision to use Chinese alternative medicine with the goal of improving public health education
programs and health insurance coverage to reduce economic and health disparities for minority racial
groups.
